Approved Technology

Google Classroom

Google Classroom will be used to assign and collect student work.

Google Meet/Zoom

Teachers will use Google Meet and/or Zoom for live lessons and class connection. Lessons may be recorded and posted for review by students unable to attend live sessions.

School Email

Teachers will continue to communicate with parents using school email. To reduce the volume of email parents receive, each grade level's advisor will compile information from all teachers into one email as needed; however, non-advisors will contact students or parents directly regarding individual student needs. Email will be used primarily for parent-teacher communications or to reach out to students individually about concerns or compliments. Google Classroom and not email will be the student's primary source for assignments and class updates.



RenWeb

Teachers will continue to use RenWeb to post grades and lesson plans. Please check RenwWeb on a daily basis.

Online Class Etiquette for Students

- Students will behave in an online class in the same manner as they would in a physical class.
- Proper attire is required.
- All necessary school supplies (paper, pencil, books, etc.) must be gathered before joining.
- Find a flat surface to work on in a room with minimal distractions.
- Students must not have access to personal phones or Ipads/tablets (unless necessary to get online) during classes.
- Video must be left on for the duration of the meeting, and audio must be available when a response is requested from a student.
- Active participation is essential for successful online classes.

Weekly Schedule

As distance learning differs dramatically from the traditional classroom model of education, your child's day at home will not exactly mimic a day in the classroom. Kirby Hall teachers remain committed to providing the advanced curriculum along with a personal connection that is the hallmark of our small but mighty school. Teachers will offer a combination of resources for students, including regularly scheduled live online instructional classes, pre-recorded lessons, one-on-one video meetings, academic exercises, and assignments. Students will be expected to collaborate fully in the learning process while staying safe at home.

Parents will receive a master schedule of online class meetings at the beginning of the distance learning term. Teachers of core academic subjects reserve the right to add class days as curriculum and/or student need demand; however, these added classes will always be at the regularly scheduled time.

3rd Grade

The third-grade teacher will schedule at least four live lessons per week. As one teacher covers all core subjects for these grades, he will assess the needs of his students when determining daily length of online classes. A set schedule, including time frame, will be provided to the parents at the start of distance learning.

- Spanish will be scheduled for three days a week for students.
- Drama/Music will be scheduled for two live 50-minute lessons per week.
- P.E. will be scheduled for three live 30-minute lessons per week.
- Art will be scheduled for two live 30-minute lessons per week.

4th and 5th Grade

The fourth and fifth-grade core academic teachers (Math, Science, History, Spanish, and English Language Arts/Literature) will schedule between 2-5 live lessons per week and each lesson will last up to an hour. As different academic courses require different amounts of lecture and independent practice, core teachers will carefully consider student needs before setting weekly live class requirements. These lessons will be spread out across the five academic days of the week, so that on each day fourth and fifth-grade students will meet with at least two core academic teachers. Teachers may add classes as curriculum or student needs demand; however, apart from extenuating circumstances, any changes made will require a minimum of one-week notice and will be communicated to students and parents.

Fourth and fifth- grade are transitional years in which we move towards increased critical thinking skills over memorization of facts. As such, the primary goal is to use reading and writing to help the children think. The constraints of distance learning require careful consideration of many factors when deciding on best practices. One significant factor to consider is screen time.

Weekly Schedule, cont.

In a study by the National Institute of Health, researchers found the following while studying adolescent brains:

- MRI scans found significant differences in the brains of some children who reported using smartphones, tablets, and video games more than seven hours a day.
- Children who reported more than two hours a day of screen time got lower scores on thinking and language tests.

Even if that screen time is spent on educational activities, the medium of learning through a screen affects the way young adults think. Focused, daily, quiet time alone with a book and paper and pencil will go a long way in helping children increase attention span, sit with ideas to notice detail and ambiguity, and begin to articulate their own ideas in a more thorough manner.

Additionally, the fourth and fifth-grade Language Arts curriculum is project-based and not lecture-based. Students need ample time to work on assignments. During distance learning, the ideal is for student work to be completed during typical school hours without evening homework.

With student learning as priority, Ms. Arnell will offer the following resources to provide the highest quality education during distance learning:

- Twice weekly whole group check-ins via Zoom. During these meetings, new skills will be directly taught and specific assignment requirements will be reviewed. These meetings will occur at the same time on the same day of the week for the duration of distance learning.
- Monday through Friday, online availability for students with questions or concerns.
- Small group online classes. In my experience doing distance learning during Spring 2020, I had the most effective online learning moments with smaller classes. I want to break the rising fourth and fifth-graders into groups of 4-5 who meet on Zoom to do learning exercises with me. This way, every student will be seen and heard and not lost in a checkerboard of Zoom faces.
- Clear and consistent assignments which require students to exercise skills after receiving direct instruction.
- Daily feedback on assignments. Regular and consistent engagement in student work.
- Drama/Music will be scheduled for two live 50-minute lessons per week.
- P.E. will be scheduled for three live 30-minute lessons per week.
- Art will be scheduled for two live 30-minute lessons per week.

The administration will review each grade level's online teaching schedule before it is published to ensure that the student's day and week is balanced.



Grading

Each teacher will communicate grading details as applicable to his/her course. Adjustments to standard grading as detailed in course syllabi will be communicated.

Student engagement is our priority and participation is essential.

Teachers are very cognizant of the fact that distance learning differs from traditional learning. As such, assignments will be modified to fit the changing academic environment; therefore, these assignments should be considered required.

Students or parents should reach out to teachers if their child is unable to complete an assignment.

Student Expectations

- Log in daily to see assignments. Utilize some sort of planner to facilitate completion of assignments and reminding of important events such as tests or project due dates.
- Complete all schoolwork to the best of your ability. Contact the teacher to discuss any issues you may have completing work or for general questions.
- If a class is not meeting live on a particular day, work on the independent assignment at that time to maintain a consistent schedule.
- Complete and submit assignments in the desired format for each teacher.
- Follow all rules in *Online Class Etiquette for Students*.
- Attend all of the live lessons and actively participate!
- Remember that behavior online should be consistent with school rules and general online etiquette.
